I mentioned to Mel that whereas the guidance received from the White House (Kissinger's September 23 memo) stated that an orderly program should be instituted leading to operational capability in 1976, we might have to choose between holding the 1976 IOC date and the might set by Dave Packard at the ExCommeeting of November 1971.
